

## SEMANTIC DEVELOPMENT MILESTONES



*Semantics is the understanding of word meanings and the relationships between words. Children's semantic development is a gradual process beginning just before the child says their first word and includes a wide range of word types.*

<p><b>A 1 year old can:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Name some common objects</li> <li>✓ Follow simple one-step directions</li> <li>✓ Identify some body parts</li> <li>✓ Answer basic yes/no questions</li> <li>✓ Understand some locations words (e.g., in, on)</li> <li>✓ Understand simple what, where and who questions</li> </ul>	<p><b>A 2 year old can now also:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Understand a variety of word types (e.g., nouns, verbs, pronouns, prepositions, etc.)</li> <li>✓ Understand some simple concept terms (e.g., big/little)</li> <li>✓ Begin to follow simple two-step directions</li> <li>✓ Include basic emotions words in vocabulary (e.g., sad, happy, mad)</li> <li>✓ Understand some basic grammatical markers (e.g., -ing, plural s)</li> </ul>
<p><b>A 3 year old can now also:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Name parts of objects (e.g., wheels, door handle, etc.)</li> <li>✓ Sort objects into categories (e.g., foods, animals, clothing, etc.)</li> <li>✓ Identify items that are the same or different</li> <li>✓ Understand exclusionary term 'not' (e.g., find the hat that is not blue)</li> <li>✓ Use some shape, colour, letter and number words</li> </ul>	<p><b>A 4 year old can now also:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Describe the function of common objects (e.g., chair is for sitting, car is for driving)</li> <li>✓ Describe differences and similarities between objects</li> <li>✓ Provide common antonyms (e.g., wet vs dry) and synonyms (e.g., fast and quick)</li> <li>✓ Identify things that go together (e.g., ball and bat, fork and spoon) from a small group of items</li> <li>✓ Describe an object using 3 or more adjectives (e.g., size, shape, texture, appearance, etc.)</li> </ul>
<p><b>A 5 year old can now also:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Sort items based on different categorization qualities (e.g., items that move, come from a farm, living vs non-living, etc.)</li> <li>✓ Use a growing variety of words based on personal interests and experiences (e.g., musical terms, sporting words, cultural customs, etc.)</li> <li>✓ Understand temporal concepts (e.g., before, after, yesterday, today, tomorrow)</li> <li>✓ Provide simple definitions for some known words (e.g., genius means someone who is really smart)</li> <li>✓ Use past knowledge to help them understand new word meanings</li> </ul>	<p><b>A 6 year old can now also:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>✓ Name categories and subcategories (e.g., Clothing – winter items)</li> <li>✓ Describe an item with four or more terms (e.g., category, parts, description, place of origin, etc.)</li> <li>✓ Identify less obvious differences and similarities between objects (e.g. a bike is different from a motorcycle because one has an engine and the other you pedal)</li> <li>✓ Understand superlatives (e.g., big, bigger, biggest)</li> <li>✓ Understand more conjunction words (e.g. unless, so, while, since, etc.)</li> <li>✓ Understand ordinal position (e.g., first, second, third, fourth, etc.)</li> </ul>
